BIOGRAPHY - DISCOGRAPHY

Dr. Tamás Cseh is a prominent figure in Slovakia's classical music scene. He is well-known as a violist, conductor, and soloist.

Education

- He began his studies at the Corvin Mátyás High School in Veľký Meder (1998–2002),
- and continued at the Bratislava Conservatory from 2002 to 2006, majoring in viola under the direction of Kornel Klatt.
- From 2006 to 2014, he studied at the Academy of Performing Arts in Bratislava,
- where he earned his doctoral degree (ArtD.) in 2014 under the mentorship of Associate Professor Jozef Hošek.
- Between 2011 and 2013, he pursued postgraduate studies at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna in the class of Professor Wolfgang Klos.

- He has also worked as assistant conductor at:

 - the Slovak Philharmonic, under the direction of conductor Jaroslav Kyzlink.

In 2020, he founded the Danube Chamber Music Festival, where he has served as artistic director ever since. The goal of the festival is to offer high-quality classical music concerts in cities along the Danube, such as Dunajská Streda, Veľký Meder, Komárno, Bratislava, and Samot. The festival's motto is: "Five concerts, five locations - atmosphere, value, joy."

The uniqueness of the festival lies in its collaboration with both local and international artists, aiming to bring classical music to audiences who previously had limited access to such performances. Over the past years, the festival has hosted esteemed artists such as

As the founder of the Cseh Tamás Band, he has toured extensively across Europe with great success.

He currently serves as the principal violist of the Slovak National Theatre Symphony Orchestra.
